### New Location for the Food Centre

May 1 marked a momentous date in the history of the Centretown Emergency Food Centre. After 45 years at 507 Bank Street in the basement of Centretown United Church, the centre has relocated to the City of Ottawa's Catherine Street Community Service Hub at 370 Catherine. The move included the launch of a new name, logo and website. Removing the word "emergency" and adding "community", the centre now goes by **Centretown Community Food Centre** (CCFC) – a name better reflecting its role in the community of helping neighbours in need. The new logo features a cart icon which represents the shopping model offered at the new centre which has expanded its hours. The website, <a href="ccfcottawa.ca">ccfcottawa.ca</a>, has also been revamped.

Diana Mahaffy, the manager of the centre, put a highly organized plan in action to implement the move that went off without a hitch. "This move is over a year in the making", said Christine Kincaid, Chair of the Accommodations Committee of the centre.

Thanks to the generosity of CCSAC churches, donors and supporters, the centre was able to purchase new shelving, refrigeration, furniture and even brightly branded aprons worn by staff and volunteers. CCSAC funded reusable shopping bags – branded with the shopping cart icon from the new logo – as gifts to clients to mark the opening and help with the transition to reusable shopping bags.

The co-location with the City's Catherine Street Community Service Hub offers many benefits to clients of the food centre. In addition to being a fully-accessible facility, it is a welcoming drop-in centre with washrooms, charging stations, public computers, Wi-Fi and access to government services. Clients can take a number and wait in comfort before their turn to be served. Once in the centre, each client is provided a shopping cart and, with the help of a volunteer or staff member, can select what they need from the shelves – more closely modelling a grocery store experience.

Forever grateful to CCSAC and especially to Centretown United Church, this move represents a new chapter in the life of the centre and opens up possibilities for the provision of even better service to the people of Centretown.

## CCSAC's Community Kitchen Project



With encouragement from the Centretown Churches Social Action Committee, the Community Kitchen project launched on March 7, 2023. Three downtown churches – Glebe-St. James United, First Baptist and St. Andrew's Presbyterian – open their kitchens for several hours one day a week each so that those living in our neighbourhood who lack adequate cooking facilities may come to prepare meals for themselves and their families. A community kitchen is available Tuesday to Thursday. All three churches have chosen to open their kitchens during the day to accommodate guest cooks who have school age children. In addition to its facilities, each church provides someone to manage appointments, a session coordinator, volunteers, basic cooking equipment and utensils, and a few ingredients. Guest cooks must make an

appointment for kitchen time, make their own way to the kitchen, bring their own ingredients and containers for taking away their meals and help with kitchen cleanup after each cooking session.



## Ottawa Innercity Ministries

Margo Dewar, Managing Director of Ottawa Innercity Ministries (OIM), was a special guest at the April 3 meeting of CCSAC. Ms. Dewar described their mission as helping people on the street survive by giving them emergency food, clothing, and personal items. Equally important is the companionship that OIM volunteers share with street friends in a caring and non-judgemental way. Today, their volunteers meet up to 170 homeless people during a 3-hour walk in downtown Ottawa, a dramatic increase from 60 just two years ago. OIM offers an Innercity Arts program for youth and an Outreach and Support program for veterans. They are located at 391 Gladstone Street.
